How to Use This Daily Reflection:

Each day we will very simply pray (P.R.A.Y.) ‘P’: PAUSING to be still. ‘R’: REJOICING with a Psalm and REFLECTING on a Scripture. ‘A’: ASKING God to help us. ‘Y’: YEILDING to His will in our lives, come what may. Allow this rhythm to deepen your awareness of God’s presence and guide you to live out His mission in your daily life.

Week 06: Call on the Lord for Others

Monday: Monday – Standing in the Gap (1 Samuel 12:23)

Pause: Take a moment to breathe deeply and acknowledge God’s presence.

Rejoice: Today I rejoice in the God whose heart moves toward His people, calling us to join Him in love.

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“The Lord is near to all who call on Him, to all who call on Him in truth. He will fulfill the desire of those who fear Him; He also will hear their cry and save them.”

– Psalm 145:18-19

Reflect: Intercession is more than words; it is entering into God’s heart for others. Like Samuel, we are invited to remain steadfast in prayer even when it’s difficult or unseen. Our prayers carry weight in the spiritual battle for hearts, families, and communities.

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“Moreover, as for me, far be it from me that I should sin against the Lord by ceasing to pray for you; and I will instruct you in the good and the right way.” – 1 Samuel 12:23

Ask for me: Lord, show me who You want me to lift up in prayer today. Help me to intercede with love, persistence, and humility.

Ask for my community: Father, build a culture of intercession in our church, among our families, and within our city, so that prayer becomes a means of grace and restoration.

Reflect: As I reread the passage, I see that prayer is a moral and spiritual responsibility, not an optional task.



“Moreover, as for me, far be it from me that I should sin against the Lord by ceasing to pray for you; and I will instruct you in the good and the right way.” — 1 Samuel 12:23

Yield: I yield my hands, heart, and words to be used by You for the sake of others.

Tuesday: Praying Through Brokenness (Job 42:7-10)

Pause: Quiet your mind and bring awareness to God’s presence.

Rejoice: Today I rejoice in the God who restores and heals, even through our own frailty.



“The righteous cry out, and the Lord hears, and delivers them out of all their troubles. The Lord is near to the brokenhearted, and saves those who are crushed in spirit.” — Psalm 34:17-18

Reflect: Intercession often calls us to pray for those who have wronged us or misunderstand us, just as Job did. Our prayers can participate in God’s redemptive work, transforming both the receiver and the intercessor.



“Now the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite: ‘My anger burns against you and your two friends, because you have not spoken the truth about Me, as My servant Job has.’ Therefore take seven bulls and seven rams and go to My servant Job, and offer a burnt offering for yourselves; and My servant Job will pray for you, for I will accept his prayer not to deal with you according to your folly. So Eliphaz the Temanite and Bildad the Shuhite and Zophar the Naamathite did as the Lord commanded, and the Lord accepted Job’s prayer. And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he prayed for his friends...” — Job 42:7-10

Ask for me: Lord, help me bring honesty and grace into my prayers for others, even when it’s difficult.

Ask for my community: Father, may our church and families be places of intercessory care, lifting one another in prayer through seasons of pain and misunderstanding.

Reflect: As I reread the passage, I recognize that intercessory prayer can be a pathway to restoration and reconciliation.



“Now the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite: ‘My anger burns against you and your two friends, because you have not spoken the truth about Me, as My servant Job has.’ Therefore take seven bulls and seven rams and go to My servant Job, and offer a burnt offering for yourselves; and My servant Job will pray for you, for I will accept his prayer not to deal with you according to your folly. So Eliphaz the Temanite and Bildad the Shuhite and Zophar the Naamathite did as the Lord commanded, and the Lord accepted Job’s prayer. And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he prayed for his friends...” — Job 42:7-10

Yield: I yield my judgments and my heart to God, trusting His work through my prayers.

Wednesday: Boldness in Intercession (1 Timothy 2:1-4)

Pause: Quiet your heart and acknowledge God’s authority and nearness.

Rejoice: Today I rejoice in the God who invites us to approach His throne with confidence for others.



“For the Lord God is a sun and shield; the Lord gives grace and glory; no good thing does He withhold from those who walk uprightly. O Lord of hosts, how blessed is the man who trusts in You!” — Psalm 84:11-12

Reflect: Intercessory prayer requires boldness and perseverance. Paul instructs the church to pray for all people—not selectively, not conveniently—but with intentionality and courage. Our intercession participates in God’s plan and aligns us with His purposes for others.



“First of all, then, I urge that entreaties, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity. This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.” — 1 Timothy 2:1-4

Ask for me: Lord, help me to pray boldly and faithfully for others, not shrinking back in fear or apathy.

Ask for my community: Father, may our congregation adopt a posture of bold intercession, covering our families, leaders, and city with persistent, Spirit-led prayer.

Reflect: As I reread the passage, I am reminded that intercession is both a privilege and a responsibility—one that can impact the lives and salvation of others.



“First of all, then, I urge that entreaties, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity. This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.” — 1 Timothy 2:1-4

Yield: I yield my fear and hesitation, stepping into Your throne room on behalf of others.

Thursday: Loving Those We Pray For (Psalm 109:21–22)

Pause: Be still and quiet your mind. Invite God’s presence to fill your heart as you prepare to lift others in prayer.

Rejoice: Today I rejoice in the God whose steadfast love calls us to lift others in prayer, remembering Psalm 33



*“Behold, the eye of the Lord is on those who fear Him, on those who hope in His steadfast love, to deliver their soul from death and to keep them alive in famine.”
— Psalm 33:18–19*

Reflect: Intercession stretches our hearts beyond comfort and familiarity. Like Samuel, Job, and Paul, we are called to carry the burdens of others—even those who misunderstand or oppose us. Praying for others in love transforms our hearts and aligns us with God’s redemptive work. Through this practice, we participate in His mercy, allowing God’s purposes to move in and through our lives.



*“But you, O Lord my Lord, deal on my behalf for Your name’s sake; because Your mercy is good, deliver me. For I am poor and needy, and my heart is wounded within me.”
— Psalm 109:21–22*

Ask for me: Lord, help me pray with love and courage for those I struggle to love. Teach me to persevere in intercession with humility.

Ask for my community: Lord, build a culture of intercession in our congregation and community, where we faithfully carry one another before You in prayer.

Reflect: As I reread these words, I ask God to open my heart to act in love through persistent prayer.



*“But you, O Lord my Lord, deal on my behalf for Your name’s sake; because Your mercy is good, deliver me. For I am poor and needy, and my heart is wounded within me.”
— Psalm 109:21–22*

Yield: I surrender my emotions, expectations, and outcomes to You, trusting that Your mercy and purposes will prevail.

Friday: The Power of Persistent Intercession (James 5:16–18)

Pause: Take a deep breath and acknowledge God’s presence. Rest in the assurance that your prayers are heard.

Rejoice: Today I rejoice in the God who strengthens those who intercede on behalf of others



“Love the Lord, all you His godly ones! The Lord preserves the faithful and fully repays the proud. Be strong, and let your heart take courage, all you who hope in the Lord.” — Psalm 31:23–24

Reflect: Intercessory prayer is not only an act of love—it is a spiritual weapon that can bring transformation and healing. James reminds us that the prayers of the righteous are powerful, effective, and capable of changing circumstances. When we pray consistently and with faith, we join God in His work of redemption, both in our own lives and in the lives of those around us. Persistent prayer invites God’s presence and intervention, reminding us that we are never powerless when aligned with Him.



“Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective prayer of a righteous man can accomplish much. Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops.”— James 5:16–18

Ask for me: Lord, help me persevere in prayer, trusting that You are at work even when I do not see it.

Ask for my community: Lord, teach our church to be a community of intercessors, praying faithfully for one another and our city.

Reflect: As I reread these verses, I am reminded that my prayers are never in vain and that God’s power moves through persistence.



“Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective prayer of a righteous man can accomplish much. Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops.”— James 5:16–18

Yield: I release all outcomes to You, Lord, trusting Your timing and will above my own desires.
