How to Use This Daily Reflection:

Each day we will very simply pray (P.R.A.Y.) ‘P’: PAUSING to be still. ‘R’: REJOICING with a Psalm and REFLECTING on a Scripture. ‘A’: ASKING God to help us. ‘Y’: YEILDING to His will in our lives, come what may. Allow this rhythm to deepen your awareness of God’s presence and guide you to live out His mission in your daily life.

Week 09: Call on the Name of Jesus

Monday: The Power of Confession (Romans 10:9–10)

Pause: I take a deep breath and center my heart on Jesus, the one whose name brings salvation.

Rejoice: I rejoice in the name that brings freedom.



“Sing to the Lord, bless His name; tell of His salvation from day to day.” — Psalm 96:2

Reflect: Calling on Jesus begins with recognition of who He is and what His name accomplishes. Romans 10:9–10 reminds me that the act of confessing Jesus as Lord is more than words—it is a posture of trust, aligning my heart with the reality of His resurrection and power. My salvation begins not in my strength, but in acknowledging His.



If you declare with your mouth, “Jesus is Lord,” and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved. — Romans 10:9–10

Ask for me: Lord, help me to confess You not only with my lips but with my life today.

Ask for my community: Lord, give my church courage to call on Your name in boldness and trust.

Reflect: As I reread, I am reminded:



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Yield: I place my heart and day into Your hands, Jesus, trusting in Your name.

Tuesday: The Promise for All (Romans 10:11–13)

Pause: I pause to remember that Jesus’ name is for everyone, everywhere, not limited by background, circumstance, or past mistakes.

Rejoice: I rejoice in the inclusivity of His salvation.



“Bless the Lord, all you His angels, mighty in strength, who fulfill His word, obeying the voice of His word!” — Psalm 103:20

Reflect: Romans 10:11–13 teaches that calling on Jesus is not restricted—it is for all who trust Him. The promise extends across divisions of culture, ethnicity, and status. This reminds me that God’s mercy is broad, and my calling on His name invites others to experience that same hope. My prayers, confessions, and acts of love are all rooted in the understanding that His name is accessible to every person.



As Scripture says, “Anyone who believes in him will never be put to shame.” For there is no difference between Jew and Gentile—the same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him, for, “Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.” — Romans 10:11–13

Ask for me: Lord, help me trust fully in Your promise today and to live in a way that points others to Your saving name.

Ask for my community: Father, may those around me experience Your salvation as they call on Jesus’ name, and may our church be a living example of inclusivity and grace.

Reflect: As I reread, I reflect on one word or phrase that the Holy Spirit might be pointing out to me today.



“These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with His brothers.” — Acts 1:14

Yield: I surrender my biases and limitations, trusting that Your name has power for all who call upon it.

Wednesday: Salvation in His Name (Acts 4:10–12)

Pause: I pause to acknowledge Jesus as the one true source of salvation and the one who acts on my behalf in every circumstance.

Rejoice: I rejoice in the power and sufficiency of His name.



“The Lord is my strength and my song; He has become my salvation.” — Psalm 118:14

Reflect: Acts 4:10–12 reminds me that salvation is found in no one else. There is no alternative, no backup plan—Jesus is the one in whom we are made whole. Understanding the exclusivity of His name helps me live with confidence and courage. It also frees me from seeking security or identity in anything else: wealth, influence, or human approval. Salvation in His name transforms my priorities, interactions, and response to challenges.



let it be known to all of you and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead—by this *name* this man stands here before you in good health. He is the stone which was rejected by you, the builders, *but* which became the chief corner *stone*. And there is salvation in no one else; for there is no other name under heaven that has been given among men by which we must be saved.” — Acts 4:10–12

Ask for me: Lord, keep my focus on You as the source of all salvation, that I might act in alignment with Your will today.

Ask for my community: Lord, help our church to proclaim Jesus boldly in every conversation and act, and to live in the reality of His saving power.

Reflect: As I reread, I reflect on one word or phrase that the Holy Spirit might be pointing out to me today.



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Yield: I give You honor, authority, and control over my life, Lord, trusting fully in Your name.

Thursday: Exalted Above All (Philippians 2:9–11)

Pause: I pause to lift my thoughts to Jesus, the one exalted above every power, authority, and name in heaven and earth.

Rejoice: I rejoice that His authority reigns over all creation.



“I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will recount all Your wonderful deeds.” — Psalm 9:1

Reflect: Philippians 2:9–11 shows that God has exalted Jesus and given Him the name above every name. To call on His name is to participate in acknowledging His supreme authority. It reminds me that obedience, praise, and trust are responses to this truth. Calling on Jesus’ name aligns my actions with heaven’s reality and invites His kingdom to shape my life today.



For this reason also, God highly exalted Him, and bestowed on Him the name which is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bow, of those who are in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and that every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. —Philippians 2:9–11

Ask for me: Lord, help me honor Your name in all that I do, letting every choice reflect Your lordship.

Ask for my community: Father, may our church lift Jesus above all else in unity, devotion, and service.

Reflect: As I reread, I reflect on one word or phrase that the Holy Spirit might be pointing out to me today.



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Yield: I offer my life, words, and actions in full obedience to the One whose name reigns supreme.

Friday: The Promise Realized (Acts 2:21-24)

Pause: I pause and prepare my heart to rejoice in the salvation, power, and hope that Jesus’ name brings.

Rejoice: I rejoice that His name delivers, restores, and gives life.



“I will bless the Lord at all times; His praise shall continually be in my mouth.” — Psalm 34:1

Reflect: This universal promise is not abstract—it has been realized through Jesus. As the early church demonstrates, calling on His name is both personal and communal, bringing restoration, boldness, and transformation. This week, I can trust that every prayer in His name carries power and invites God’s work into my life and the lives of those around me.



‘And it shall be that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.’ “Men of Israel, listen to these words: Jesus the Nazarene, a man attested to you by God with miracles and wonders and signs which God performed through Him in your midst, just as you yourselves know— this *Man*, delivered over by the predetermined plan and foreknowledge of God, you nailed to a cross by the hands of godless men and put *Him* to death. But God raised Him up again, putting an end to the agony of death, since it was impossible for Him to be held in its power. — Acts 2:21-24

Ask for me: Lord, help me call on Your name with confidence and devotion today.

Ask for my community: Father, awaken hearts in our church, city, and families so that all may call on Your name and experience Your salvation.

Reflect: As I reread, I reflect on one word or phrase that the Holy Spirit might be pointing out to me today.



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Yield: I entrust my life, week, and decisions to Jesus’ name, resting in His saving power.
